My father was also diabetic and suffered from hypertension, and my maternal grandmother was a double amputee because of diabetes. It does not take a rocket scientist to know that with my family history, my sedentary lifestyle and the fact that I am an African American male, I need to be extremely careful about my health. Several Centenarians have been helping me get and stay on track. I am part of a covenant group, (which includes Sheryl Howard, Kametris Wyatt, Cynthia Haley, Robin Mathews and Sherita Lee) committed to losing weight and being as healthy as we possibly can. We pray for each other every day, weigh-in on a regular basis, do group activities and support each other as much as possible.

Charles (Chuckie) Parker heard about what we were doing and suggested we join him bicycling. Chuckie has entered the FedEx MS Bike Tour, a 150 mile bike ride to Tunica, MS and back. I plan to join Chuck for as many of the seventy-five mile trip down to Tunica as I can make. There are rest stops and potty breaks every six-to-10 miles, and my goal is at least 25 miles. Next year, I hope to be ready for the whole 150!

But it's just as important to give attention to our spiritual life and health as it is to our physical life and health. Personal prayer and bible study, group bible study, Sunday School, covenant relationships, worship, and all the means of grace (including holy communion conferencing Christian [conversation]) help us be and remain spiritually healthy. WHY is your Blood Sugar Level so Important?

Latest studies show how controlling your blood sugar can play an important role in helping you recover.

- Your blood sugar level will be tested to determine if you have a high blood sugar level called hyperglycemia. Your healthcare team may give you medication to help lower your blood sugar level to help your body fight infection and recover fast.
- Quite often patients have elevated blood sugar levels while they are in the hospital. This is one of the normal ways your body responds to severe illness, injury, medication, stress and surgery.
- It is very important to control your blood sugar level. Studies show that certain patients in intensive care with good blood sugar levels did not develop the complications other patients did. This could mean fewer infections and going home sooner.
- In order to control your blood sugar level, your healthcare team may need to test it regularly.
 Sometimes it may have to be tested every hour (if hospitalized). Only a small drop of blood is needed for this testing.
- Sometimes your body needs help and you may receive medication called insulin to help keep your blood sugar level in control. Insulin can be given to you by a shot, a pill or added to your intravenous (IV) drip if hospitalized.

Tight Blood Sugar

- If you do have a high blood sugar level, it does not mean you have diabetes. This is usually temporary in a hospital setting. Usually after a patient recovers, a non-diabetic patient returns to normal levels.
- Your blood sugar levels will have to be tested for as long as they are elevated.
- It is also important that your blood sugar does not fall too low. It is important to have the right combination of medication and food to keep your blood sugar level in control.

These headlines were painfully reinforced with a picture of 2-year-old Jakira Lewis' body surrounded by three children and an adult. Editor's note: "Our goal in publishing this picture is to show the humanity, the suffering and the loss caused by the senseless violence that is all too common on Memphis streets." We need to pray and to take action.

Centenarians, our international world is in need of healing. There is Israel's strategic goal of neutralizing Hamas in Gaza and Hezbollah in Lebanon. There are cross border raids by Islamic militants into Israel. There are anxieties surrounding Iran's nuclear ambition and North Korea's nuclear arsenal. There is the war in Iraq and "President Bush's decision to increase the number of U.S. troops in violence-plagued Baghdad." "The plan, which Bush announced Tuesday, calls for boosting U.S. troop levels in Baghdad from 9,000 to 13,000." (*The Commercial Appeal, July 28, 2006*) We need to take positive action.

My fellow Centenarians, the Lord is appearing to us today through Centenary. He is giving us the same message of salvation as He gave Solomon. Let us follow God's directions so we can be healed, our city can be healed, and our international world can be healed. Amen.



Greetings, Fellow Centenarians!

The Administrative Council had a mid-year planning/assessment meeting on June 26, 2006. The purpose of this meeting was to identify Centenary's 2006 successes-to-date and areas for improvement.

After identifying our successes, the members present were then asked to cite why the effort was a success and to assess whether similar actions could be taken in regards to our areas for improvement.

The following were identified as Centenary's 2006 SUCCESSES to date:

- 1. Vacation Bible School/Camp
- 2. Children's Choir
- 3. Martin Luther King, Jr. Lock-In
- 4. The Centenarian
- 5. Youth Ministry
- 6. Trustees/Improvement of church structure
- 7. P.A.C.E. Ministry
- 8. Women's Chorus ... and Music Department in general
- 9. Homebound Ministry/Shepherding Ministry
- 10. Change in Bible Study time

It was agreed that the above were successful because of:

- Dedication/committed people
- Positive attitudes
- Planning and training
- Desire to see success
- Desire to see the church's mission statement put into effect

The members were then asked to identify any areas for improvement. When identifying these areas, the members were asked to consider:

- What's preventing the problem from being solved?
- *How* should the problem be solved?
- Who are the responsible parties?
- What are the recommended actions?

The following were identified as AREAS FOR IMPROVEMENT:

(Proposed actions and actions possibly taken in the near future are identified in *italic* font; agreed-upon actions to begin immediately are identified in **bold** font.)

- 1. Stewardship/Membership Finance
 - a. PRÁY!
 - b. "Poll" the congregation for a "talent pool" of resources needed ("Resources" include Gifts, Time and Talents.)
 - c. Consistent publication of finances (money received and how spent), beginning ASAP!
 - i. Published monthly in *The Centenarian*
 - ii. Published weekly in the church bulletin
 - iii. Resume issuance of the quarterly income statements
 - iv. Comparison of Spending vs. Budget and Income vs. Budget
 - d. Administrative Council to explain on a regular basis what Stewardship is
- 2. Sunday School attendance and Church attendance
 - a. PRAY!
 - b. Pray some more!
 - c. Discuss in both meetings and casual settings how to entice others to come, including:
 - i. Evaluating tentative plans of the Sunday School Department
 - ii. Asking why attendance is low/assessing why people do not attend more regularly
 - d. Ask ministries to collaborate more and participate in Council meetings
- 3. Communication/Consistency in keeping the congregation informed and in the methods used for see COUNCILOR on page 8

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communication

- a. PRAY!
- b. Shepherding Ministry will update its phone lists
- 4. Consistent, Passionate Leadership, including asking "What is God calling us to do?" (It was mentioned that this calls for both <u>Discernment</u> and <u>Accountability</u>.)
 - a. PRAY!
 - b. Recommend leaders' regular participation in both Sunday School and Bible Study
 - c. Establish a process for evaluating leadership. (EX: Lay Membership Committee present proposed slate of officers to the Administrative Council prior to the Charge Conference ... with the understanding that nominees are told that training is required.)

As emphasized above, it was noted during the discussion of Centenary's successes and areas for improvement that <u>PRAYER</u> is the key to continued success in certain areas and seeing improvement in other areas. While acknowledging that all issues discussed were important, it was agreed that improving communication about the church's finances and addressing Sunday School and church attendance were top priorities.

It was suggested that the August Administrative Council meeting (August 28, 2006) be used to set goals and that all church officers be encouraged to attend and provide input. Details from this meeting will be discussed in the next issue of *The Centenarian*.

Keep Centenary in your prayers as all of us strive to enhance the church's self-proclaimed status as "The Miracle on McLemore"!
